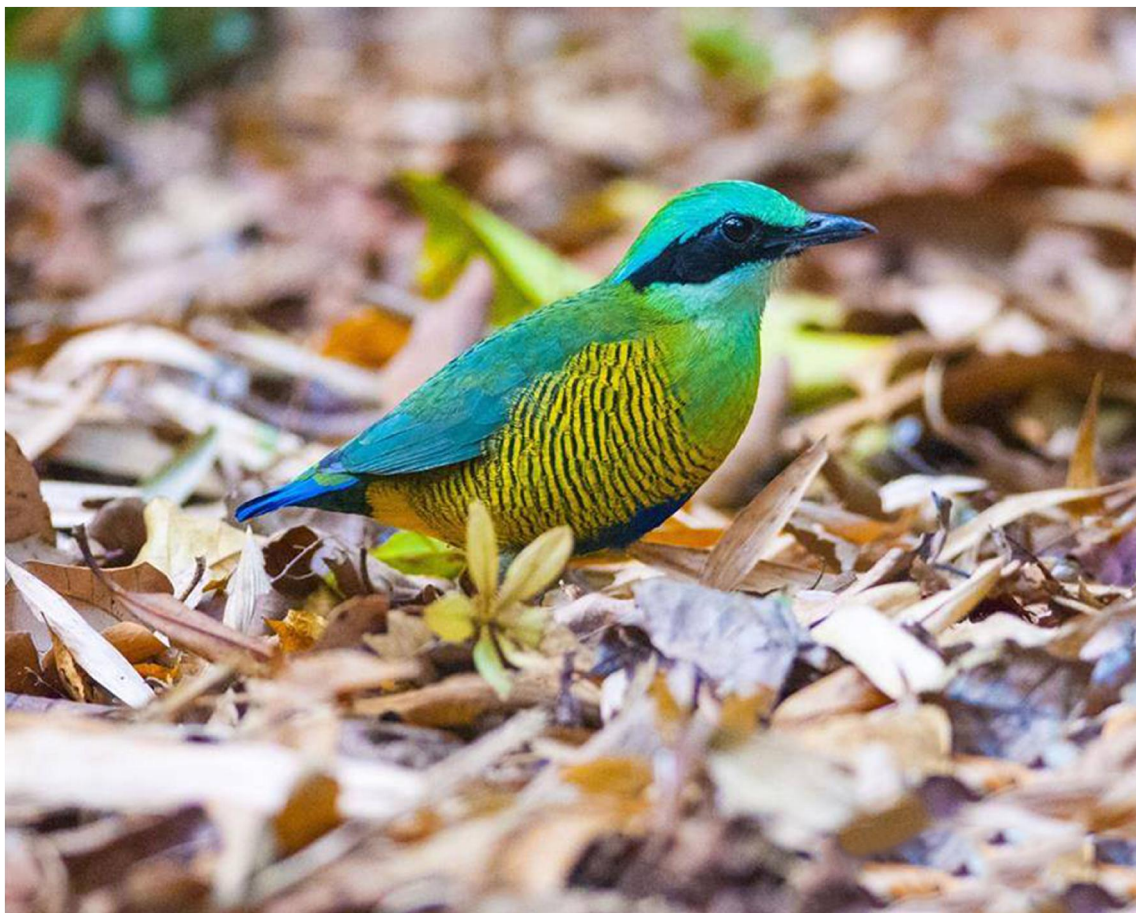

INTRODUCTION

This tour is the most comprehensive itinerary available in this fascinating and beautiful country and turns up a fantastic array of specialities. This long, narrow country harbours so many endemics and near-endemics now, that three weeks hardly seems long enough. Our exploits in the south were rewarded by **Siamese Fireback**, **Germain's Peacock Pheasant**, **Green Peafowl**, **Slaty-legged Crake**, **Hodgson's Frogmouth**, **Red-vented Barbet**, **Annam Barbet**, **Bar-bellied Pitta**, **Blue-rumped Pitta**, **Dalat Shrike-babbler**, the soon to be split local form of **White-spectacled Warbler**, **Grey-crowned Bushtit** (split from Black-throated Tit), **Grey-faced Tit Babbler**, **Orange-breasted Laughingthrush**, **Collared Laughingthrush**, **Black-hooded Laughingthrush**, **White-cheeked Laughingthrush**, **Vietnamese Cutia**, **Grey-crowned Crocias**, the tiny neat **Black-crowned Fulvetta**, **Black-crowned Parrotbill**, **Green Cochoa**, **Vietnamese Greenfinch** and **Vietnamese Crossbill**. Relatively little-known and unexplored Central Vietnam brought us **Ratchet-tailed Treepie**, the black-crested form of **Sultan Tit**, **Rufous-faced Warbler** and **Limestone Leaf Warbler**, **Yellow-billed Nuthatch**, **Sooty Babbler**, **Indochinese Wren-Babbler** (formerly Short-tailed Scimitar Babbler), rare **Rufous-cheeked Laughingthrush** and **Chestnut-eared Laughingthrush**, **Black-crowned Barwing**, **White-tailed Flycatcher**. In the north, despite some poor weather, we found the endangered **White-eared Night Heron**, **Pied Falconet**, **White-winged Magpie**, more **Green Cochoas**, **Black-browed Fulvetta** and **Rufous-throated Fulvetta**, **Limestone Wren-Babbler**, **Grey Laughingthrush**, **Short-tailed Parrotbill** and **Fork-tailed Sunbird**. Special mammals that we saw well included **Buff-cheeked Gibbon**, both **Black-shanked Douc Langur** and **Red-shanked Douc Langur**, and the restricted-range **Hatinh Leaf Monkey**.

TOUR SUMMARY

The tour began at the airport in Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon), but we were soon on our way, along a brand new road system, to Cat Tien National Park. This is probably the best protected reserve in Vietnam, and it certainly shows these days, with markedly increasing and healthy populations of a number of birds and mammals that have sharply declined elsewhere. A lot of our time was spent along the forest edge, exploring small clearings and shady tracks. **Chinese Francolin**, **Green Peafowl** and **Germain's Peacock-Pheasant** showed well and we were even lucky enough to see a displaying male **Siamese Fireback** right in the middle of a road. **Broadbills** are always a joy, and we were fortunate to see three amazing **Dusky's** building their nest at point-blank range, as well as some gaudy **Black-and-red's**. Three other crackers, **Banded Kingfisher**, **Blue-bearded Bee-eater** and **Great Slaty Woodpecker** performed, and flowering trees attracted a surprisingly large number of scarce **Golden-crested Mynas**, as well as superb **Crimson Sunbird** and **Van Hasselt's Sunbird**. As temperatures rose scarce large waterbirds thermalled-up into view, and we spotted **Oriental Darter**, **Lesser Adjutants** and **Woolly-necked Stork**. We spent quite a bit of time in Cat Tien's extensive bamboo-brakes, which hold a wide variety of species. A crippling **Slaty-legged Crake** strolled in front of us, **Black-and-buff Woodpeckers** came in nicely and we enjoyed unusually good views of **Large Scimitar Babbler**. **Orange-necked Partridge** and **Pale-headed Woodpecker** gave us the run-around. Leafy trails brought **Scaly-breasted Partridge**, **Puff-throated Babbler** and **Abbott's Babbler**, and the indochinense race of **Scaly-crowned Babbler**, while bird-waves held **Great Iora** and the subtle but regionally endemic **Grey-faced Tit-Babbler**. As dusk fell huge **Great Eared Nightjars** emerged from their day-roosts to head out across the Dong Nai River and **Large-tailed Nightjars** skimmed overhead. **Brown Boobooks** and **Asian Barred Owlets** showed easily as usual, but **Blyth's Frogmouth** proved difficult to connect with. Working more open areas, we found wintering **Grey-faced Buzzards**, flocks of **Ashy-headed Green Pigeons**, scoped a male **Violet Cuckoo** and saw **Vinous-breasted Starlings**, and **Indochinese Bushlark**. A good range of mammals included **Yellow-throated Marten**, showy **Buff-cheeked Gibbons** and **Black-shanked Douc Langurs**, the fantastic little **Northern Smooth-tailed Treeshrew**, **Lesser Mouse-Deer**, and a hulking **Sambar** stag. Perhaps the most memorable event at Cat Tien was the fantastic close views that we were able to obtain of pittas. A recently developed set-up involves waiting in some small hides where tiny mealworms are put out. Stunningly

colourful **Bar-bellied Pittas** (a regional endemic), which have become habituated to these areas, come hopping in to feed at point-blank range; while the shyer **Blue-rumped Pitta** requires more patience, time and effort.

From Cat Tien, we had a relatively easy drive to our hotel at Di Linh, pausing to sample some of the regions finest coffee en route. Based at this small town, we had the best part of two days to get to grips with the rich birdlife of the excellent forested pass referred to as Deo Nui San, along the Phan Thiet road. There were many specialities for us to chase here. Three regionally endemic **Black-hooded laughingthrush**, **Orange-breasted laughingthrush** and **White-cheeked laughingthrush** all showed, and we had some fine antics with **Bar-backed Partridge** and **Blue Pitta** (the latter escaping us on this occasion). Gaudy **Indochinese Green Magpies** were vocal enough but hard for us to collectively get onto. **Grey-crowned Bushtit** and **Black-headed Parrotbill** were more obliging, as were lovely **Long-tailed Broadbills** and wintering **White-throated Rock Thrushes**. A good number of **Yellow-vented Green Pigeons** were seen in flight, along with the commoner **Barred Cuckoo-Doves**. Our initial efforts with **Hodgson's Frogmouth** drew a blank.

Moving on to Da Lat, we paused at Da Tan La for lunch. This touristy waterfall is still surprisingly birdy too. We found our first **Vietnamese Greenfinches** and **Kloss's Leaf Warblers**, and also enjoyed rather confiding **Orange-headed Thrushes** amongst the leaf-litter, **White-throated Rock Thrush**, **Burmese Shrike**, **Hill Prinia**, **White-cheeked Laughingthrushes**, **Chestnut-vented Nuthatch**, **Mugimaki Flycatcher**, **Little Pied Flycatcher** and **Grey Bushchat**, not to mention the stunning johnsiform of **Black-throated Sunbird** –amazingly still not elevated to full species status.

In the afternoon we visited the Ta Nung Valley. A bit quieter than usual but with large numbers of **Annam Barbets**, sprightly **Bay Woodpeckers**, **Grey-cheeked Warbler** and **Lanceolated Warbler**, and nice close **Black-headed Sibias**, amongst other things. After dark we moved to a different area for **Hodgson's Frogmouth** but struggled again -the saga continued!

Our first morning on the Da Lat Plateau saw us heading-up in jeeps to Mt Lang Bian, with the endemic **Collared Laughingthrush** in our sights. Multiple encounters this year involved about eight birds, with some coming very close to us. The rest of the morning went very well, with a string of other specialities, as we duly bagged **Dalat Shrike-babbler**, the local form of **White-spectacled Warbler** (in the process of being split), excellent little **Black-crowned**

Fulvettas at ridiculously close range, a noisy party of **Vietnamese Cutias**, a couple of unexpected **Green Cochoas**, and the hulking great endemic **Vietnamese Crossbill**. A potential split from Red. A fantastic little **Pygmy Cupwing** (formerly Wren-Babbler) showed brilliantly. We even reached the summit for the first time in many years, and enjoyed a spectacular view of the surrounding forested mountains.

In the afternoon we were back at Ta Nung, but this time we enjoyed a lot more success. Four **Grey-crowned Crocias** showed really well –here very close to the type locality at Cam Ly, and we had nice views of **Mountain Hawk-Eagle** and **Hodgson's Hawk-Cuckoo**. Shifting location just after dark, we finally succeeded in getting a superb **Hodgson's Frogmouth** into full view for all.

On our second morning on the plateau, we visited Ta Nung, Da Tan La and finally the forested slopes above Ho Tuyen Lam. The latter proved particularly rewarding, with some good views obtained of a stunning **Blue Pitta**. During the day we also found the local form of **Golden-throated Barbet**, leucotis **Eurasian Jay**, **Green-backed Tit**, **Red-billed Scimitar Babbler**, **Rufous-backed Sibia**, the plain local form of **Blue-winged Minla**, **Mrs Gould's Sunbird**, and a nicely scoped male **Vietnamese Greenfinch**.

Leaving Da Lat predawn, we headed to the regional airport and took a flight north to Da Nang. Continuing towards the mountainous interior, we stopped for lunch by a nice marshy area. The highlight here was a good breeding colony of scarce **Streaked Weavers**, and we also spotted **Yellow Bittern**, **Black-backed Swamphen**, **Blue-tailed Bee-eater** and **Green Bee-eater**. We continued on to remote Mang Den, excited at our prospects in the little-visited Central Highlands. We had a full day and a morning to explore the Mang Den area, birding along narrow paved and rough logging roads. The main draw here is the endemic **Chestnut-eared Laughingthrush**, which was only discovered in the 1990s. We soon located a singing bird and watched it for a lengthy spell in the dense forest understorey it calls home. **Black-hooded Laughingthrush** was refreshingly common here the slightly different sweetiform. Several encounters with **Indochinese Green Magpie** and **Indochinese Wren-Babbler** brought varying results, and a long list of other good birds included **Silver Pheasant**, **Jerdon's Baza**, **Golden-throated Barbet**, **Silver-breasted Broadbill**, the whacky **Ratchet-tailed Treepie**, **Yellow-cheeked Tit**, the striking black-crested form of **Sultan Tit** (should it be split?), a scoped **Yellow-billed Nuthatch**, cracking little **Rufous-faced Warblers**, an obliging **Spot-throated Babbler** that stayed put for us all to get onto, **Grey-headed Parrotbill**, **White-gorgeted Flycatcher**, **White-**

tailed Flycatcher and **Pale Blue Flycatcher**, and a number of **Pin-tailed Parrotfinches** zapping around. **Rusty-naped Pitta** was heard tantalizingly close but in some very challenging understorey, and **Coral-billed Scimitar Babbler** slipped away.

From Mang Den we penetrated further towards the Lao border, over nighting in a surprisingly good hotel not far north of infamous Dak To –the scene of fierce battles during the Vietnam War. A wetland area en route turned up a cracking **Wire-tailed Swallow**. By dawn the following morning we reached the Loxo Pass, home to another rare near-endemic, the striking **Black-crowned Barwing**. A pair were soon found calling, but unfortunately a bit of an uphill hike was required to obtain close-ups! A few other odds-and-ends here included **Black-throated Laughingthrush**, **Silver-eared Mesia**, **Plumbeous Redstart**.

We continued on towards Bach Ma National Park, passing through the impressive Hai Van Tunnel, and arriving at Lang Co Beach Resort in time for lunch. The gardens were a bit quiet but we did find **Light-vented Bulbul** and several **Grey-capped Greenfinches**. **Dusky Warbler** and **Radde's Warblers** side-by-side in the same bush was a first. The afternoon was slow and we settled in to our accommodation near the top of Bach Ma.

The next morning was spent exploring several trails. We had more glimpses of **Indochinese Green Magpie** and another lengthy encounter with **Indochinese Wren-Babbler**. There was little else to show for our efforts; a tame **Buff-breasted Babbler**, **Indochinese Yuhinas**, our first **Black-browed Fulvettas**, and tricky **White-gorgeted Flycatchers**. **Annam Partridge** called way down the valley. Some calling **Annam Gibbons** (a recent split from Buff-cheeked) slipped by out of site. We headed north to our next hotel, ready for the long day to follow.

The next stage of our Vietnamese adventure took us close to the Lao border once more, to some extensive areas of relatively undisturbed broadleaved evergreen forest. We began at Deo Sa Mu for the seldom seen **Rufous-cheeked Laughingthrush**. It was a beautiful spot, and we hit a rich birding vein during the early morning hours. The laughingthrushes themselves were not uncommon and we saw them very well, right next to the road. Our birding flurry included, **Black Eagle**, migrating **Grey-faced Buzzards**, **Common Cuckoo** (which breeds in Central Annam), an angry **Collared Owlet**, brilliant perched **Asian Emerald Cuckoo**, the patchily distributed **Moustached Barbet**, **Clicking Shrike-babblers**, **Silver-eared Mesia**, and a more typical form of **Black-throated Sunbird**. A couple of calling troupes of Endangered Southern **White-cheeked Gibbons** were heard, but unfortunately out of our reach. We continued along a

series of back roads, heading north. Another stop for roadside birding produced our first glimpse of **White-winged Magpie**, though nothing to do it justice, and amazingly good views of a stunning **Spot-necked Babbler**.

We arrived at the west gate of Phong Nha-Ke Bang National Park about an hour before dusk, in time to get some initial looks at pair of **Sooty Babblers** messing about on a limestone outcrop. Some **Grey-headed Lapwings** along the river where an unexpected bonus.

Staying close to the national park, we enjoyed a full day in the field. The morning was quite busy with nice views of both **Sooty Babbler** and **Limestone Leaf Warbler**, while the afternoon was highlighted by scope views of two endangered primates, the superb **Red-shanked Douc Langur** and **Hatinh Leaf Monkey**. Yet more singing **Indochinese Wren-Babblers** were seen, and other good birds were **Common Emerald Dove**, scoped **Yellow-vented Green Pigeons**, resident **Cook's Swifts** (split from Pacific or Fork-tailed), **Green-eared Barbet**, **yellow-crested Sultan Tits**, **Indochinese Yuhina**, **White-vented Myna**, **Hainan Blue Flycatcher**, and **Blue Whistling Thrush**. The variety and number of butterflies was stunning.

From Phong Nha, we drove to Dong Hoi Airport, and flew north to Hanoi for the final leg of our epic journey. In Hanoi we were greeted by dreary skies and rain, and it didn't look like changing in a hurry. We continued on to Cuc Phuong National Park, stopping en route at VanLong Nature Reserve. Unfortunately, poor visibility, wind and rain, meant that it was impossible for us to scan the limestone crags for **Delacour's Leaf Monkey's**, which was terribly disappointing. We persevered for a while, making do with a few **Black-backed Swamphens** and a **Pheasant-tailed Jacana**.

The next day and a morning were spent around the Bong area, deep in the heart of the Cuc Phuong National Park, and it pretty much rained the entire time! Wintering thrushes were very few, and we could only find a few **Orange-headed Thrush** and **Japanese Thrush** after extensive searching. A nice male **Grey-winged Blackbird** was a surprise though. We were also surprised to put-up two different **Malayan Night Herons** from the roadside at dawn, though neither stayed long enough to give us really satisfying views. A pair of **Rufous-throated Fulvettas** did perform though. Inside the forest we had many vocalizing **Limestone Wren-Babblers** and another **Bar-bellied Pitta**, but apart from that it was tough going in the dripping wet conditions. Along the forest edge we managed another **Jerdon's**

Baza, Grey-backed Shrike, Yellow-bellied Warbler, Black-browed Fulvetta, White-tailed Flycatcher and Hainan Blue Flycatcher, Yellow-vented Flowerpecker and Fork-tailed Sunbird.

From Cuc Phuong we had a longish drive to Tam Dao National Park. We had another look at Van Long Nature Reserve on the way, but the weather was still very poor. All we could manage to add was a **Cotton Pygmy Goose**, better views of **Pheasant-tailed Jacana**, and **Black-browed Reed Warbler** and **Pallas's Grasshopper Warbler**. We continued on to our comfortable hotel at Tam Dao, arriving in the evening. We barely had more than a day at Tam Dao, and we were expecting bad weather. Fortunately, although it was a bit foggy, we enjoyed a very successful visit. Several of the main targets, **Chestnut Bulbul, Grey Laughingthrush** and **Short-tailed Parrotbill**, appeared for us multiple times, and we also enjoyed another **Collared Owlet, White-browed Piculet, Grey-chinned Minivet, Blyth's Shrike-babbler, Ratchet-tailed Treepie, David's Fulvettas, Brownish-flanked Bush Warbler** and **Pale-footed Bush Warblers, Asian Stubtail, Grey-crowned Warbler** and **Bianchi's Warbler, Streak-breasted Scimitar Babbler, Black-chinned Yuhina, Japanese White-eye**, a pair of **Green Cochoas** (with the female collecting nest material), **Pale Blue Flycatcher** and **Hill Blue Flycatcher, Fork-tailed Sunbird**, and both **Tristram's Bunting** and **Chestnut Bunting**. Intriguing were several singing thrushes that were thought to be resident **Scaly Thrush**, rather than winter migrant **White's Thrush**.

We finished off the tour with a trip up to Ba Be National Park, staying there for one night. Our target here was the Endangered **White-eared Night Heron**. Only five birds are currently known from the site, and they are easily disturbed (even by visiting birdwatchers), so we counted ourselves lucky to get such close views of two during our first boat trip across this, the largest natural freshwater lake in Vietnam. The lake is also a good place for the rare and local **Mandarin Duck** and we had great views of 11 birds. Two other goodies that we saw very nicely were **Pied Falconet** and **White-winged Magpie**, finishing off the tour on a high.
